Annual Plant Share—Come Join Us

Well, it looks like our winter it beginning to wane, though maybe not as fast as many of us would like. It's hard to remember that spring isn't far away. Those plants that have been buried in the snow and covered by all those late falling leaves are beginning to stir. In just a few weeks, our gardens will begin to awaken. As the temperatures improve, those little plants will quickly begin expanding and taking over places where they might not be wanted. When that happens, what do you do?

That's where the Annual Plant Share comes in. On Saturday, April 30, we will hold a plant share in front of the tennis courts off Governor Yeardley Drive. You can pot them, bag 'em or just wrap them in newspaper and bring them by. The cardboard lids from a copier paper box works well, too. There will be plastic bags available to take your new additions home, if you need them.

For those bringing plants, if you know the plant's common name and something about the place they grow best in, that's a plus but not a requirement. We usually have a few people in attendance that know their

landscaping and native plants pretty well, and they can usually help out. We try to group the plants by the amount of sunlight they need each day – "full sun", "partial shade" and "heavy shade".

I've been attending this plant share for the last few years and have picked up some very interesting plants. Most have done well. Some years we have garden vegetable plants and annual

> bedding plants, or vines and small trees or ornamental grasses. Even if you have no plants to share and you're just looking to for something special or different, feel free to stop by and take a look. It is not a requirement that you have plants to share to take something home.

The purpose of the event is to **share with our neighbors.** So start checking your gardens and

flower beds to see what needs thinning and don't throw them out. Save them for the Plant Share. 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



Neighborhood Watch

I'm happy to report that Neighborhood Watch continues to make its presence felt in Middleridge, many thanks to the Morales, Obuchowski, and Holston families for volunteering for patrols this month. Unfortunately, I have to report that there were some incidents in our neighborhood this month. There was an act of vandalism where a house was shot by a paintball gun. Additionally, there were some cars that were broken into this month. The good news is that the police were contacted about the vehicle break-ins and I'm told they did obtain some fingerprints from the cars. Again, these are reminders that we must remain vigilant, be aware of what is going on in our neighborhood, and remain alert. To assist with this I wanted to share some crime prevention tips published in the Fairfax County Police West Springfield District Information Bulletin from February 14, 2011. Stay Safe.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

Vehicle Security:

- Lock all vehicle doors.
- Remove valuables from vehicle.

• Absolutely never leave a GPS device affixed to the windshield when not in use, remove and store in console, glove box, or better yet, inside a home.

• Lock your vehicle even when parked in a garage.

• If your vehicle has an alarm, please activate when vehicle not in use.

• If you have an alarm service, i.e., On-Star, Lojack, please keep current on monthly fees (in-service).

• Be familiar with your vehicle information (VIN, Registration number, Insurance carrier) should an incident occur.

• Never leave your vehicle idling without someone in the vehicle.

• Never leave a spare key hidden within the vehicle.

• Never leave a key in the ignition (unattended).

Home Security:

• Lock all doors and windows to the home when away (vacation, running errands, etc). This holds true at night when you are sleeping.

• If the home has an alarm system, please use it. Ensure it's registered with the county.

• If you have an attached garage, please close the door. If on vacation, deactivate the automatic garage door opener.

• Change your alarm code every once in a while.

• Lock all interior doors leading to the main house. This includes basement and garage doors. • Use exterior lighting. Flood lights, motion detectors, lamp posts are essential to deterrence.

• Trim bushes around windows.

view of a window, i.e. a purse sitting on a table next to a door or window.

• If you have extension ladders in the tool shed, under a deck, etc., it's worth securing with a lock.

• Secure all tool sheds (easy source of tools to gain entry to your home).

• Be conscientious of open second story windows, decks, or other means criminals may use to climb to a second story window.

• Make sure deadbolts are installed on exterior doors (single key, double key).

• Consider enhanced locking devices for sliding windows (pins).

• Get to know your neighbors, your neighborhood, watch out for each other.

• If you notice suspicious persons or activity, call the non-emergency police number (703-691-2131) and report it.





Audubon At Home March, 2011

Spring Peepers are Calling!!!

The month of March is time to open your ears. Birds are singing during the mornings in increasing numbers. But for me the nightly shrill trill of the Spring Peepers calling from damp spots in our neighborhoods is the best harbinger of warm weather to come. Spring Peepers are a small greenish tree frog with an "x" on their backs. They are common, but secretive, and rarely seen. They live solitary lives clinging to trees and shrubs, except during the spring breeding season when they migrate to marshes to lay their eggs. To see one, put on your rubber boots, take a flashlight and follow your ears one spring night. This is a very good challenge for your senses of hearing, sight and balance, as you try to find the little guys in damp, slippery terrain. To me, such

an adventure is FUN! A truly different way to experience our neighborhood. Pith helmet optional.

I've previously written that we have a

number of amphibians living among us. The Spring Peeper is the loudest, but the Wood Frogs call even earlier. They are adapted to living in cold temperatures and are the only amphibian known to breed north of the Arctic Circle. A Wood Frog's call is not a trill, but more of a short croak or grunt. They begin calling when there is still a fringe of ice on the ponds, but can still be found calling in March. They are easy to identify, a small brown frog with a black face mask. By April, the American Toad will add its voice to the evening chorus. It's trilling call is pitched lower than the Spring Peeper's call and is easily distinguished. As the waters warm up even more, Green Frogs and Bullfrogs will add their calls and the Spring Peepers will stop. Their cousins, the Gray Tree Frogs, will take up the airwaves for the summer months.

Because actually seeing frogs takes a lot of effort, scientists have learned to count frogs by using their calls as an indication of population size. These population studies have been going on for some time now and the results show that frogs are declining rapidly. A charismatic scientist named Kerry Kriger started a nonprofit three years ago to educate people about frogs. He spoke to the Master Naturalists two years ago and opened my eyes to just how rapidly amphibian populations are declining.

"Actually seeing frogs takes a lot of effort, scientists have learned to count frogs by using their call as an indication of population size." I had always known that pesticides and habitat loss were affecting frog populations, but had no idea that a

new contagious disease caused by chytrid fungus is killing entire frog populations. Here is his description of how the disease is spreading:

Humans ship millions of amphibians around the world each year. When an infected frog arrives in a new location, its disease can spread to native populations if (1) it escapes captivity, (2) it is intentionally set free, or (3) water from its holding tank is released into the environment. Native amphibian populations generally have no evolved defenses against the new pathogen, and an epidemic that results in population decline or extinction can occur. The largely unregulated pet and food trades are the two most common sources of disease introduction into naïve amphibian populations. For instance, the skin disease chytridiomycosis has been detected in Mexican axolotls Ambystoma mexi*canum* in Australian pet shops, and in American bullfrogs Lithobates catesbeiana being farmed for international trade in Uruguay. Infected frogs are also unintentionally exported internationally via the zoo trade and laboratory animal trade.

By requiring that any pet store you frequent certifies that the amphibians it sells are free of the Chytrid Fungus, you can help stop its spread. Not a lot of effort on your part, but a little thing that can have a huge impact in helping amphibians, like my favorite Spring Peepers, survive into the future. Dr. Kriger will be speaking in Fairfax on May 7. Save the date and take your family to hear him. It will open your eyes and entertain, too. Details below.

Monthly Gardening Tip

Remember that the Chesapeake Bay Foundation says DO NOT FER-TILIZE our lawns in March, April or until after the grass has bloomed in mid- to late-May. Much of the excess fertilizer applied in the Chesapeake Bay watershed washes into the bay and causes algae blooms that damage the habitat of the blue crab and other wildlife. Please talk with your neighbors about this issue – especially about not leaving fertilizer on streets, driveways and sidewalks where it washes directly into our local streams. Sweep up any that has fallen on these surfaces.

What you may want to apply to your lawns this time of year is a preemergent weed killer to help control crabgrass and other weeds. You can apply any time between March 15 and when the forsythia blooms are fading from the bushes. *Be sure to purchase a weed killer that is not combined with fertilizer*. The fertilizer you applied last fall should be doing its job now.

MULCH: Too much of a good thing?

If you choose to apply shredded

hardwood mulch to help control weeds in your flower beds, be moderate in using it. Two inches of mulch is plenty to suppress weed seeds from germinating and not too much to smother the trunks of your valuable landscape plants and trees. Instruct hired gardeners that this is the proper amount, too. You do not need to pay for them to spread six inches of mulch on every part of your garden. Thick mulch against a tree trunk encourages termite and other insect damage, vole damage and fungus growth. This is too much of a good thing!




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

Invasive Plant Removal Prgram Reaches Milestone

This program is one that Sarah Mayhew has written about in the past and Carolyn has provided us with a nice follow-up from the Fairfax County Parks Website.

The Fairfax County Park Authority's Invasive Management Area (IMA) program will celebrate its 1,000th workday this February 2011. The timing matches the celebration of National Invasive Species Awareness Week in Washington at the end of the month. The 1000th workday is planned from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, February 16, at the Lake Accotink IMA site.

IMA was established in

2006 and has shown wonderful progress over the past five years. Fairfax County parkland is healthier due to the habitat restoration efforts of dedicated volunteers who remove nonnative invasive plants and assist in natural regeneration by planting native plant species. This volunteerbased stewardship program has seen 4,620 volunteers work nearly 18,000 hours to manage more than 50 acres of parkland.

The IMA program has had over one



point six million customer contacts through education and outreach events such as Girl Scout Gold Award projects, Boy Scout Eagle projects, Green Festivals, scientific meetings, and Virginia Master Naturalist activities. Upcoming IMA events include:

Global Youth Service Day, Saturday, April 16. Various sites will offer volunteer opportuni-

ties to cut, pull, and bag invasive species, help save trees, and return the natural balance to our forests' ecosystem.

The 4th Annual Invasive Plant Removal Day, May 7, 2011. Events will be held statewide over a twoweek period. Most IMA sites will focus on the removal of garlic mustard, a biennial herb which threatens native plants and animals in forest communities by outcompeting native plants with copious amounts of seed, and by secreting a chemical that prevents the germination of other plants.

Volunteer Fairfax's Volunteer Fest Day, Saturday, October 22. IMA volunteer site leaders will participate for the sixth straight year.

The IMA program has been recognized with numerous awards, including the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors' Environmental Excellence Award, the Park Authority's Elly Doyle honors, and Volunteer Fairfax Service Awards. IMA partners include Earth Sangha, park sites, the Virginia Department of Forestry, Potomac Conservancy, and Fairfax ReLeaf. 
Electric Sunday, March 27th 10-3, 9850 Furnace Road, Lorton, VA 22079
