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Reminder—April 30 is Plant Share Day

With this issue of the newsletter, we're only a few weeks away from this year's Plant Share. I don't know about your yard but the warmer weather and those frequent showers are certainly encouraging everything to grow – grass, perennials, even the weeds.

Now's the time to start looking at your planting beds to see what has survived the snow and ice of this winter and what plants have started to exceed its boundary space. Have those hostas just taken over that entry way? Is your ground cover hiding your walk to the side yard? Don't just dig up the excess and throw it away. Consider sharing it with your neighbors.

That's where the Annual Plant Share comes in. On Saturday, April 30, we will hold a plant share in front of the tennis courts off Governor Yeardley Drive. You can pot them, bag 'em or just wrap them in newspaper and bring them by. The cardboard lids from a copier paper box

works well, too. If you'd rather pot them up but don't have any, give me a call – I'll share what I have. We'll have plastic bags available that morning to take your new additions home, if you need them.

It is not a requirement that you have plants to share to take something

home. The goal is to get these plants to a new home so others may enjoy them, rather than just recycling them through composting or throwing them in the trash. It also helps our neighbors save money and allows for low-cost gardening experimentation. If the new plant doesn't work out, all you've lost is a little time and energy. If a perennial works out, you've saved yourself \$5 to \$20 per plant. In years past, we have had such things as garden vegetable plants and annual bedding plants, or vines and small trees

or ornamental grasses.



The purpose of the event is to **share with our neighbors.** So start checking your gardens and flower beds to see what needs thinning and don't throw them out. Save them for the Plant Share. 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Neighborhood Watch

Our Middleridge Neighborhood Watch Program continued to be strong this past month with help from the Bayer, Mayhew, Paine, Armstrong, Vander Maten and Campbell families who continued the patrols. For those that would like to assist in patrols in the community, we're happy to announce that a training session is scheduled for Wednesday, April 6, 2011, at 7pm in the Laurel Hill Clubhouse (8380 Laurel Crest Drive down by South County High School). The training session will be given by Fairfax County Police and is specifically meant as an awareness training session for those that want to contribute to their own neighborhood watch. This particular session is open to everyone.

In addition to the tips from previous bulletins, we'd like to also make folks aware that with the warmer temperatures, there are a few additional things to consider:

- 1. Remember to close and lock your windows and doors, especially the sliding glass doors, which we might open during the day or evening for a nice breeze. Having been closed for the last few months, these are the easiest to forget when we go to bed or out for the day.
- 2. A nice bike ride on a Saturday or Sunday is a great way to enjoy the weather, but remember to lock or store your bicycles in the evening. Bicycles left unattended at night have been prime targets for night time thefts in this neighborhood and others in the area.
- 3. Be mindful of the many window solicitors in the neighborhood. While many of them may be honest hardworking people, opening your door to a stranger gives them an opportunity

to look through your home and see your valuables. Asking them to give a quick quote from an outside view and then rescheduling for an appointment later gives you time to research the company and prevents prying eyes.

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
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I Live Here in Middleridge!

Audubon At Home March, 2011

There is so much happening in the natural world in April! Greening of the deciduous trees, spring wildflowers bursting out of the forest floor, tree flowers bursting out above, birds calling, frogs calling, some birds migrating out of our area, as others migrate into our area. Early nesting birds are even feeding young already. Not to mention that I'm finally used to daylight savings time and can enjoy the mornings again! April is definitely the time to get out of the house and enjoy what nature has to offer us right here in Fairfax.

There are several news items I would like to pass along to you. On Sunday, March 27, I worked with several volunteers at the invasive plant removal site in Woodglen Lake Park that was first monitored for invasive plants in 2006. Over the past five

years, we removed many bags of English Ivy, Japanese Honeysuckle, Multiflora Rose and other non-native alien plants that had smothered one corner

of the park. On March 27, we managed to find some spots where the ivy had come back from roots, but most of that study area was *totally clear of English Ivy*. Instead, we found Spring Beauty wildflowers coming into bloom. A very local success story.

Moving to the county level, Fairfax has been certified a Community Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation (NWF). This voluntary certification shows that a number of residents, businesses and public institutions have chosen to recognize that we share our land with birds, insects

and other wildlife and resolved to treat the land in an environmentally friendly way. Seeking to certify your yard or business property as a wildlife habitat is a good way to learn about nature. Walk around your property and imagine what kinds of animals might live there. Do you provide food, such as a plant with berries? Do you provide cover and a place where they can raise their young? Do you have a water source available for animals? Do you minimize the toxic chemicals you use on your property? If so, you may already qualify for the NWF Wildlife Habitat program. If you aren't even sure what some of these terms mean (for example, cover in this context is neither a wool blanket nor backup artillery fire), it is easy to learn more from either the NWF or the Audubon Society of Northern Virginia. For more information on how you can make your property part of the Fairfax NWF Community Wildlife

Habitat, visit the federation's website, www.nwf.org. To compare the NWF Wildlife Habitat pro-

gram with the Audubon Society of Northern Virginia's similar Wildlife Sanctuary program, visit www.audubonva.org and click on "Audubon At Home."

baby bird season and brake

for our turtles.

April and May are prime time for adding some native plants to your yard that will benefit the specific types of wildlife you would like to observe more frequently. For example, if you really like songbirds, plant some berry-producing bushes or plant caterpillar host plants for your favorite butterfly so the adults will come to your yard to lay their eggs and you

will get to see the young emerge, too. That's a double-butterfly-bang for your buck. It is frustrating trying to locate native plants at most of the local garden centers. I have compiled a list of 9 plant sales hosted by local nonprofits in April and early May that will have many native plants for sale. Some of these sales include native plants grown from local seed sources, thus offering plants well adapted to our climate. The list is too long to reproduce here, so if you would like a copy, please send me an email (sarah.mayhew@yahoo.com) and I'll reply with the list.

SHORT NOTES: KEEP CATS IN-SIDE during baby bird season – especially May and June. If you must let them out, do so later in the morning and bring them in before dinner, as birds are most actively feeding early in the morning and in the evening. A recent article in the New York Times stated that more birds are killed by cats than by wind turbines or other mechanical means. It really adds up. One study showed that so many baby Catbirds, a very common songbird related to Mockingbirds, were killed by cats that the population was not able to maintain itself.

PLEASE BRAKE FOR TURTLES: Box turtles will soon be emerging from hibernation. They can live to be 100 years old, and their ability to close up inside their shell has saved them from many predators. Their domed shell, however, is no match for an automobile. If you can safely stop, please place the box turtle on the far side of the road in the direction in which it was traveling. If we don't protect them, there may be no gentle box turtles in Fairfax for future generations to enjoy.





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

Spring Cleanup Big Success

Thanks to the efforts of many volunteers, the spring 2011 clean up of our local parks, streams and lake shore was a big success. Cold temperatures did not deter the enthusiastic Girl Scouts,

neighbors and students completing service hours from showing up at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 26, to receive a bright orange trash bag and yellow recycle bag. Groups fanned out to pick up

trash in their designated areas, returning at noon to report how much they found. The trend towards less trash continues, with plastic bottles once again the most abundant item.

We collected 12 bags of garbage. We also recycled 3 bags of clean plastic bottles and 1 bag of clean aluminum cans. The odd item found this time was an abandoned desktop computer. Electronics, such as this com-

puter with a unique
"bottle drive" (see lower
right corner of photo), contain toxic materials that
can pollute the water and
soil. Kudos to our student
volunteers who carried
this heavy and very
muddy piece of junk out of

the stream and to our collection point. It will be safely recycled at an upcoming "Electric Sunday" event.
